



With a sprint, timed just right, that used up his last ounce of suergy, "Curitie" Currier won the first road race of the L. A. A., last Monday, covering the three and one-half mile course in 18 minutes and 10 seconds. The Page brothers.—Carl and Vernon,—took the second and third prizes, fialshing strong, only a few yards behind Currier, and Joseph Buckley won the 4th cup, finishing alone a few seconds behind the leaders.


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
Promptly at 10 o'clock the ten contestants were started from the Town Hall, accompanied by a patrol of Boy Scouts on wheels, while over a thousand spectators double-quicked to the Playground towitness the finish. The first report at the one mile mark showed the four leaders bunched, with a second division of the younger runners sticking together a short distance behind. The order in turning Five Forks was never announced, for scarcely had the courier arrived when three runners appeared on Llocoin street, surrounded by bleyeles and autos. It was a pretty sight, as for the last half mile they ran abreast, stride for stride, until Currier's aprint 100 yards from the

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Buckley had been selzed with cramps on the State road and dropped out, but recovering again took up the grind and passed all but the first three. The fight for 5th place was a duplicate of the one for first, Bartlett, Day and Haynes coming up to the finish in a bunch, the sprint separating them by a few yards in the order named. Mader, Ferry and Hadley all finished the course in the order named. The efficiency of the Boy Scouts was

all finished the course in the order named. The efficiency of the Boy Scouts was well illustrated by an incident within sight of the finish. A runner, exhausted, had scarcely reached the fence to support himself, before a Scout from the patrol, bringing up the rear, had covered him with a blanket and by a dash of water in the face, revived him sufficiently to permit him to complete the course. The race more than justified the L. A. A. in languirating it and will surely be made a feature of our next 19th.
